1. As AI Companies Race for Power, Amazon and Google Have the Lead by Jinjoo Lee -Amazon has an incumbent advantage, and Google stands out for some innovative approaches. The rapid adoption of AI has intensified power demand among hyperscale cloud companies, with Amazon and Google at the forefront. Amazon's US self-built data centers now use up to 9 gigawatts of power, a figure comparable to an entire state's generation capacity. Google and Microsoft trail with capacities around 5 gigawatts each, while Meta sits at 4 gigawatts. The competition is not merely about expansion but also about securing reliable, scalable power sources to meet the growing requirements of AI workloads. All the hyperscalers have also placed bets on novel technology providers that promise to eventually supply cheap, clean, reliable and fast energy. These range from small modular nuclear reactors, advanced geothermal and novel batteries to solar energy beamed in from space. SpaceX and Google are even eyeing data centers in space. 2. Analysis: Proposed Building Codes Would Cost Americans \$9.2B Per Year - The [U.S. Department of Energy \(DOE\)](#) released a new analysis finding that nationwide adoption of the 2024 International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) would significantly increase housing construction costs and burden American families with costly Green New Scam mandates. DOE's analysis found that the 2024 IECC would increase residential construction costs by more than \$9.2 billion annually compared to the 2006 code levels, adding more than \$127 billion in cumulative costs nationwide. If states choose to update their energy codes to the 2024 IECC, construction costs for a typical single-family home could increase by as much as **\$14,000**. These costly mandates force American families to pay thousands of dollars more upfront for a new home, while projected energy savings may take decades to materialize. In most states, estimated payback periods exceed 10 years, with some exceeding 20 years. 3. The Trump Administration Has Decided Not to Extend USMCA Trade Deal - The United States has declined to extend the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) during its mandatory six-year review, launching a 10-year countdown that could ultimately bring an end to the agreement unless the three countries agree to significant revisions. The move, announced Wednesday by the Trump administration, does not immediately terminate the agreement. Instead, it activates the treaty's "sunset clause," requiring annual reviews until 2036 unless the United States, Mexico, and Canada reach a consensus on extending the pact for another 16 years. The decision injects fresh uncertainty into one of the world's largest trading blocs, which governs nearly \$2 trillion in annual trade among the three nations. 4. Toyota, in \$3.6 Billion Move, Shifting Tacoma Production to Texas from Mexico - Toyota said Monday it will shift most production of its midsize Tacoma pickup truck from Mexico to the United States as part of a \$3.6 billion investment in its San Antonio, Texas, plant. The transition from Toyota's Tijuana, Mexico, facility will take roughly four years, the Japanese auto giant said. The announcement comes just days after Washington declined to renew a North American trade pact with Mexico, as well as Canada, fueling uncertainty for businesses. Toyota said in November it planned to invest as much as \$10 billion in the United States over the next five years. The world's largest automaker by vehicle sales, Toyota plans to build a second assembly line at its San Antonio factory, creating more than 2,000 jobs and increasing annual production capacity at the plant by 150,000 units, the company said in a statement. 5. Construction Firms Add 11,000 Jobs in June - Construction firms added 11,000 jobs in June and 64,000 over 12 months, as pay for craft workers climbed faster than for production workers overall, according to an analysis by the [Associated General Contractors of America](#) of new government data. Association officials cautioned, however, that future construction job gains are at risk unless Congress acts quickly to pass new highway and transit legislation before the current law expires on Sept. 30. Construction employment totaled 8,331,000 in June, seasonally adjusted, an increase of 11,000 from May. Over the past 12 months, the industry has added 64,000 jobs, an increase of 0.8 percent, outpacing the 0.3 percent increase in total nonfarm payroll employment. Gains in the industry were concentrated in nonresidential construction, with the steepest growth rate occurring in heavy and civil engineering construction, the sector that employs many highway and transit construction workers. 7. Wholesale Sales Surge in May as Electrical Products Stay Strong - U.S. wholesale sales posted another strong gain in May, led in part by continued strength in electrical products, even as inventory growth slowed, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's latest [Monthly Wholesale Trade Report](#). Electrical wholesalers reported one of the strongest performances among durable goods sectors in May, with sales up 6.2% from April and 37.2% year over year. Inventories increased 22.2% from a year ago, while the inventory-to-sales ratio improved to 0.87 from 0.97 last May, indicating faster inventory turnover. 8. Meta Expands Louisiana Data Center Project with \$50B Investment - Meta announced that it is expanding its Richland Parish, Louisiana, data center to 5GW of compute capacity in a town that's already seeing big returns for teachers, local businesses, and students. The data center expansion is an investment of more than \$50 billion in the Richland Parish region — one of the largest investments in AI infrastructure in the world, build in America — supporting infrastructure projects, workforce development programs, and an energy agreement that is expected to save Entergy Louisiana customers more than **\$2 billion** over 20 years, on top of the **\$650 million** in savings for customers from the first agreement. Louisiana Delta Community College is receiving a \$5 million donation from Meta to create scholarships to train local residents for critical data center jobs. All graduates from Richland Parish's high schools, beginning with the class of 2026, will be eligible for full scholarships for any data center-related trade certificate or course. Meta pays the full costs of the energy, water, and related infrastructure the data center uses so consumers aren't paying the cost. 9. 3M, Microsoft Partner to Advance AI Data Center Infrastructure - 3M and Microsoft announced a strategic partnership focused on AI data center infrastructure and enterprise transformation. Microsoft's Azure Cloud and AI Infrastructure will become the first announced hyperscale cloud provider to deploy 3M's Expanded Beam Optical (EBO) technology. 3M will also use Microsoft's AI and digital platforms as part of its enterprise transformation across key business functions. Together, the companies will combine Microsoft's digital and hyperscale infrastructure with 3M's materials science and precision manufacturing to accelerate AI adoption and strengthen the physical networks required for the growth of cloud and AI workloads. 10. TSMC's \$265B US Expansion: Four New Chip Fabs Planned - Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co has expanded its investment in US chipmaking capacity, bringing the total planned amount to \$265 billion. The chipmaker has earmarked another four fabrication plants as part of the \$100 billion package, bringing TSMC's total US capacity to 10 factories and two packaging facilities. The expansion comes as AI demand continues to stretch TSMC's capacity, with the company reporting record quarterly profits and raising its capital expenditure forecast to between \$60 billion and \$64 billion. It comes five months after TSMC announced its first \$100 billion investment increase, committing the company to building three additional fabrication plants, two packaging facilities, and a research lab in Phoenix, Arizona. 11. Making Daylight Savings Time (DST) Permanent - While this sounds amazing in the summer, the winter months would feel drastically different under permanent DST:

- Before the change (Standard Time): Sunrise ~6:30 AM, Sunset ~6:10 PM.
- After springing forward (DST): Sunrise ~7:30 AM, Sunset ~7:10 PM.
- **Pitch-Black Winter Mornings:** In the dead of winter (December and January), standard sunrise is around 7:15 AM to 7:30 AM across much of the US. Under permanent DST, the sun wouldn't rise until **8:15 AM or even 8:30 AM**. Most people would commute and start their workday or school day in total darkness.
- **Slightly Brighter Winter Evenings:** Instead of the sun setting at a gloomy 4:30 PM, you'd get daylight until about 5:30 PM.

12. Siemens Energy Breaks Ground on New Mississippi Factory - Siemens Energy broke ground on a new factory in Pearl, Mississippi, marking the next step in the company's effort to expand manufacturing capacity for critical grid technologies. The company announced on February 3 that it is investing \$300 million in Mississippi. The factory, Siemens Energy's second in the state, will manufacture high-voltage switchgear and is expected to create up to 300 jobs. Governor Tate Reeves presided over the ceremony. Siemens Energy has been manufacturing in Mississippi since 1973 and has a factory in Richland that makes high-voltage switchgear. Earlier this year, the company announced that it was investing \$1 billion to ramp-up manufacturing in the United States and significantly expand its workforce. Aaron Larson - The Siemens name is coming off one of the power industry's largest equipment and service suppliers. Siemens Energy announced July 14 that it has begun preparing the transition to an independent corporate brand, with Siemens Energy and Siemens Gamesa Renewable Energy to be united under a single new name: **Omterra**. 14. AI Boom to Drive Data Center Electricity Demand to 20% of US Total by 2035 - Data centers in the US are projected to consume 20% of the nation's electricity by 2035, a significant rise from 5.9% this year. The increase reflects a dramatic surge in energy demand, particularly in states like Virginia and Texas, where data centers are heavily clustered. BloombergNEF forecasts data center power requirements will reach 194 gigawatts, underscoring the sector's escalating impact on national power consumption over the next decade. 15. Trump Unveils New Tariffs Designed to Withstand Legal Scrutiny by Gavin Bade - New duties, ranging from 10% to 12.5%, will replace a temporary tariff put in place after the Supreme Court derailed Trump's trade agenda in February. Goods covered by separate national security tariffs like steel, aluminum, automobiles and parts, won't be subject to the new tariffs, and certain food and agricultural imports, fertilizers and energy products will also be exempt. The new levies are based on a frequently used section of trade law—Section 301 of the Trade Act of 1974—that is considered more legally durable than the basis for the tariffs the Supreme Court struck down. Once in place, the levies can remain indefinitely and be unilaterally altered by the president. The immediate economic impacts of the tariffs are expected to be limited, as the new tariff rates are similar to the 10% global tariff that expires early Friday.
